

Parishes from 30,000 feet









#### Catholic Population Distribution




#### Aging Infrastructure


### Uneven Aging Infrastructure









#### Number of Priests

Not enough ordinations to keep up with priests who are retiring, dying, and leaving...





....leads to an almost 1:1 ratio of priests to parishes


- Consolidated: Parishes recently experiencing consolidation indicated that one or more of the following had happened since January 1, 2005: 1) the parish was created (erected) as the result of a merger with at least one other parish; or 2) parish membership or territory was affected by the closing or suppression of a parish.
- Multi-parish Ministry: Parishes experiencing multi-parish ministry (clustered, linked, yoked, twinned, paired, or are sister parishes with at least one other parish).
- PLC Parish: Canon 517.2; entrusted to deacon or lay person








#### Age Distribution of Respondents

The overall mean = 53 years old


The White, non-Hispanic mean = 55 years old

The other minority mean = 48 years old






Minority respondents are <u>more likely</u> than white, non-Hispanic respondents to "strongly agree" that:


- Parishioners of different cultures participate in parish life together

- The diversity in the parish is reflected in the diversity of the parish staff.













# Who is in the parish...and when?

More than 75 million Americans selfidentify their religious affiliation as Catholic. Breaking down this population by parish and activity:


- 3,480 per parish in a registered household
- 3,000 per parish attending Mass at Christmas and Easter
- 2,180 per parish attending Mass at least once a month
- 1,060 attending Mass every week
- 180 per parish are "very" involved in parish outside of attending Mass








#### U.S. Religious Retention Rates: Percentage of those raised in a faith who remain affiliated with that faith as an adult


