This two-day workshop is designed to serve as a supplement for instructors who teach the unit on nationalism in AP European History but it has relevance for secondary school teachers who engage topics of the nation, nationalism, and patriotism in their classrooms in a variety of contexts across history and social studies curriculums. This is a 1 credit graduate course for teachers and meets the requirements for Act 48 credit.

HIS 9006-030 **Graduate Internship in Public History**

Students may arrange internships at area public history sites to gain practical experience in public history workplaces, develop applied research and interpretative skills, and apply their skills as historians to contemporary situations and problems. Students are expected to work at least 8 hours per week at the internship site and complete a 12-15-page research paper, approved by both their internship advisor and their faculty advisor.
