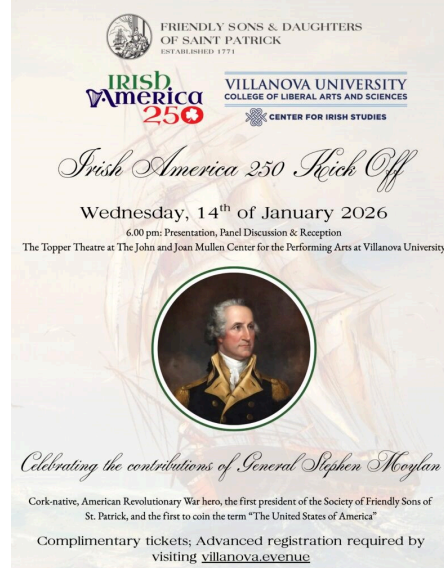
## Spring 2026 Public Events

## Thursday, January 22: Hidetaka Hirota talk: "Irish Immigration and the Origins of Deportation Policy in the United States"



The United States' deportation policy is receiving considerable attention today, but Irish immigration in the nineteenth century is often left out in the inquiry into the history of US deportation policy. This lecture explores how northeastern states developed policies for restricting immigration, including deportation, in response to Irish immigration in the mid-nineteenth century and how these state-level measures helped lay the foundations for federal immigration laws.

[Hidetaka Hirota](#) is a social and legal historian from UC Berkeley, specializing in the history of American nativism and immigration control, and the author of ***Expelling the Poor: Atlantic Seaboard States and the Nineteenth-Century Origins of American Immigration Policy***.

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## Tuesday, February 24: Cauvery Madhavan, Charles A. Heimbold, Jr. Chair of Irish Studies, Reading



Join us for our annual reading and talk, from the 2026 [Charles A. Heimbold, Jr., Chair for Irish Studies](#), Cauvery Madhavan, as part of the Villanova Literary Festival.

[Cauvery Madhavan](#) was born in India, where she began her career as a copywriter in Chennai before moving to County Sligo in 1987. She later settled in County Kildare, where she lives today with her husband near their three children.

She is the author of four novels: *The Inheritance* (2024), *The Tainted* (2020), *The Uncoupling* (2003), and *Paddy Indian* (2001). A regular contributor to *The Irish Times*, she has also written for the *Evening Herald*, *Sunday Tribune*, *The Phoenix*, *Travel Extra*, and *The Guardian*. Known for her meticulous research, she approaches both fiction and journalism with intellectual rigor and depth—often reading extensively to inform her opinion pieces. An avid reader since childhood, she cites Joseph O'Connor's *Star of the Sea* as the book that inspired her to write, and credits Amitav Ghosh as another major influence. She reads widely across genres—except horror—with a particular love for historical fiction and stories that illuminate hidden histories. She is deeply honored to serve as the Charles A. Heimbold, Jr. Chair of Irish Studies, a position previously held by some of her literary heroes.

### March 11-13: *Bellow*



*Bellow* is a heartfelt performance exploring the weight of tradition, the capriciousness of memory and the artist's need to express their true self. Ireland's leading experimental theatre company, [Brokentalkers](#), join forces with traditional musician, [Danny O'Mahony](#), a man who had dedicated his life to the preservation of traditional Irish music and to the mastery of his craft.

Now, after 40 years of breathing life into centuries-old tunes to honor the memory of those who have come before him, Danny is finally taking a moment to stop and consider what this lifelong dedication has cost him. Danny takes the audiences on a personal journey of self-reflection, revisiting pivotal moments in his life: his first taste of music as a child, the mentors who shaped him, and the unrelenting pursuit of mastery that left little room for little else.

The performance fuses traditional music, an original electronic composition by Iceland's [Valgier Siggurdson](#) and contemporary dance, heightening the tension between past and present, contemporary and traditional, preservation and progress.

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### Thursday, April 9: Dr. Cera Murtagh Book Launch

Join us as we celebrate the launch of Dr. Murtagh's book [Civic Parties in Divided Societies](#).

In Northern Ireland and Bosnia-Herzegovina, a new form of politics is emerging thirty years after conflict. Despite ongoing polarization, civic political parties - those that reject ethno-nationalism and organize around alternative identities and issues - have formed, endured, and claimed political space. Notably, these parties have emerged within the

context of constitutional power-sharing, a political system explicitly designed to accommodate ethno-national groups.

The rise of civic politics challenges the dominant narrative of deeply divided societies. Cera Murtagh explores how countries transition from armed conflict to issue-based democracies, highlighting both the institutional barriers that civic parties face and the opportunities they can seize. Drawing on extensive fieldwork, including more than one hundred semi-structured elite interviews at critical political moments, *Civic Parties in Divided Societies* is the culmination of over a decade's research on Northern Ireland and Bosnia-Herzegovina, and beyond.
