Fall 2024 Events

Wednesday, September 4 - Thursday, September 5: *Protesting Across the Divide: Social Movements in Conflict Societies*

This two-day workshop will explore the issue of social movements in deeply divided societies with a particular focus on non-sectarian movements. These are mobilizations that in some way cross-cut and/or challenge the status quo of politics and political institutions in these societies. The workshop will be interdisciplinary, featuring contributions from political science, sociology and anthropology,



among other fields. It will explore a range of empirical case studies from different global regions, including Northern Ireland, Lebanon, Burundi, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Palestine and Israel. *Photo credited to Belfast Pride, 2018 © Love Belfast

The workshop will be hosted by Villanova University, co-sponsored by the <u>Center for Arab and Islamic Studies</u> and the <u>Center for Irish Studies</u>, and in partnership with <u>Queen's University Belfast</u>. It will conclude with a roundtable discussion open to students, faculty and members of the wider Villanova community. The roundtable will address the timely issue of protest in so-called 'divided' and 'polarized' societies in different part of the world. It brings together experts on the topic to discuss how social movements are coming together across the divide in places including Northern Ireland, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Lebanon and Palestine and Israel, for causes such as peace, gender equality, LGBTQ+rights, the environment and protection of public spaces. All are welcome.

Monday, September 23: Brian O'Conchubhair Talk: "Flann O'Brien: The "Lost" Irish Genius"



Wednesday, October 9: *The Playboy of the Western World* by Bisi Adigun & Roddy Doyle



Get ready for Villanova Night on 10/9 at 7pm, at Inis Nua for a theatre performance of <u>The Playboy of the Western World</u>

Almost 120 years after J.M. Synge's blistering masterpiece *The Playboy of the Western World* shocked audiences, Inis Nua—Philadelphia's home for contemporary Irish plays—opens their 21st season with a bold adaptation by Nigerian playwright Bisi Adigun and Irish writing icon Roddy Doyle (*The Commitments, Paddy Clarke Ha Ha Ha*). Set in modern Dublin, they reimagine Synge's young rascal-hero Christy Mahon as Nigerian refugee Christopher Malomo, who arrives at a run-down pub with a wild tale he hopes will save his life.
