SUMMER CRUISE SPOTEIGHT

CORTRAMID

For their 3/C midshipman summer cruise, Villanova midshipmen had the opportunity to attend CORTRAMID, a month-long program designed to expose midshipmen to the Navy and Marine Corps communities. Each week focused on a different area: submarines, surface warfare, naval and Marine aviation, and the Marine Corps. For Marine week, MIDN drove to Camp Pendleton and stayed for three days in Camp Talega. They had the incredible opportunity to experience realistic combat scenarios through the Infantry Immersion Trainer—an immersive outdoor training complex that replicates an embattled Middle Eastern town. During surface warfare week, they spent 12 hours underway on the USS GRIDLEY, an Arleigh-Burke class destroyer, and toured a new Zumwalt class destroyer (the USS MICHAEL MONSOOR). CORTRAMID ended with aviation week, where MIDN explored a variety of aircraft simulators, went through swim qualifications, and toured MV-22 Ospreys and CH-53E Super Stallion helicopters.









2/C CRUISE

For my summer cruise, I flew into Japan and caught a Carrier Onboard Delivery (COD) aircraft to embark on the USS RONALD REAGAN (CVN-76) for my SWO Nuke training. During my time aboard, the ship was actively engaged in Operation Valiant Shield, a largescale joint exercise that integrates U.S. Navy, Air Force, Army, and Marine Corps forces in the Indo-Pacific. This operation focused on enhancing interoperability, deterrence, and combat readiness in a high-end conflict scenario, emphasizing the importance of a forward-deployed, combat-ready naval force. Overall, my time aboard USS RONALD REAGAN was an invaluable experience that deepened my understanding of both the surface warfare and nuclear communities, strengthened my appreciation for carrier operations, and reinforced my commitment to a career in naval aviation and leadership.



1/C CRUISE

Each summer, 1/C midshipmen have the exciting opportunity to go on an Aviation Summer Cruise. This cruise is approximately one month long and can take place anywhere from Norfolk, Virginia, where MIDN 1/C Dailey went this summer, to Whidbey Island, Washington, where MIDN 1/C Nattress went this summer. In Norfolk, MIDN Dailey experienced many aspects of Naval Aviation. He got to fly in multiple types of aircraft, such as the E-2 Hawkeye and MH-60R Seahawk, go underway on an aircraft carrier, and even see both helicopter and jet landings while onboard! In Whidbey Island, MIDN Nattress saw the other side of Naval Aviation, the P-8 Poseidon community. During her time with Patrol Squadron 9, she was able to shadow multiple P-8 pilots, sit in the cockpit during training flights, participate in a search and rescue training operation, and explore all over Washington. With the completion of this training, both midshipmen gained a greater understanding of the Naval Aviation community and its components.






WELCOME PROSPECTIVE MIDSHIPMEN!

From June 23 to June 27 this past summer, Villanova NROTC hosted its annual Summer Seminar for the third consecutive year. The five-day iteration gives prospective high school students a closer look at what life is like as a Navy ROTC student and guides them through the scholarship application process. The seminar begins by inserting the candidates into a highintensity environment to prepare them for the professional and stressful environment that the military can be. The intense training environment is maintained until they are situated in their rooms for the week. Each following morning would start with a PT session incorporating many different aspects of battalion PT at the unit. From conducting the PRT and CFT on West Campus, to a swim PT in the Villanova pool, the students were physically challenged in numerous ways. Additionally, the candidates were enriched mentally with different briefs regarding the application process of joining the NROTC program, and the details regarding the different naval warfare platforms. In the evenings, the candidates participated in different rotating workshops with their fellow squad members. This year, there was a firefighting workshop, an air rifle shooting range, and a COVE simulator training session. Villanova University and their staff were extremely generous by volunteering professors to give presentations on the different colleges of Villanova. From the business school to the engineering school, Villanova's academic strength was put on full display as well.












WELCOME TO THE BATTALION!

The mission of India Company is to train and mentor incoming midshipmen with the necessary skills and knowledge to succeed in NROTC at Villanova University and as future officers of the U.S. Navy and U.S. Marine Corps. India Company training priorities are to promote discipline, integrity, bearing, attention to detail, and purpose in accordance with the Code of Military Conduct, customs and courtesies, and military culture. India Company employs a training environment that is challenging both physically and mentally to prepare midshipmen for service in the fleet.







India company is broken up into three phases, which decrease in intensity each week. The first phase, known as the transition phase, takes place during the first week of classes. During transition, India Company Candidates have a strict schedule consisting of morning evolutions, academic classes throughout the day, and study hours in the evening

The second phase of India Company is the longest, it is known as the adaptation phase. During these three weeks, India Company Candidates are expected to start working together as a team to accomplish tasks. At the end of the last week is the Crucible, where the Candidates take part in their final test. This event is the most challenging thing that Candidates will do during India Company, and they will need to work as a team to get through to the end.

The third, and final, phase of India Company is the mentorship phase. This week consists of fall parade practice in the morning, academic classes during the day, and evening briefs by various Midshipmen in the battalion.



VILLANOVA EXCELLENCE

On September 26, 2024 Villanova NROTC Midshipmen attended The Villanova Veteran Alumni and General Officer Symposium held in the Villanova Room. The symposium highlighted the important relationships between education and a life of service; fostered conversation about leadership and recruiting; and explored the connection between safeguarding a free and open Indo-Pacific and U.S. national interests. Midshipmen got to hear discussions aimed to strengthen national security by representatives from academia, local industries, and Philidelphia & Washington D.C based think tanks. The symposium engaged Midshipmen in dialogue on the nation's relationship with its military through leadership and partnership.





Key speakers at the Symposium were Admiral Samuel Paparo '87 CLAS, Commander, U.S. Indo-Pacific Command. ADM. Paparo addressed the security dynamics in the Indo-Pacific region, offering insights into leading Joint Force operations in this critical area. '94 LTGEN Spain led a panel discussion on comprehensive approaches to improving military readiness. The Honorable Patrick J. Murphy, the 32nd Under Sectary of the Army and Chief management officer, provided a forward-looking perspective on the future of the force, emphasizing how technology, personnel, and evolving national security needs are shaping the military of the 21st century.



This year, the battalion has been fortunate to host several honorable guests at Villanova University, including Mike Pence, Admiral Samuel Paparo, and Admiral Ted LeClaire. Among these guests, Staff Sergeant Dennis Derr stands out. Staff Sergeant Derr joined the Marine Corps in 1998, graduating first in his basic training class of 400. SSgt Derr continued to serve with distinction over his career in the Marines, becoming a distinguished graduate of the Sergeants Course, the Infantry Squad Leaders Course, an honor graduate of Marine Combat Instructor School, and receiving several other awards for distinguished service. He left the battalion with the final words, "You can always do way more than you think you're capable of; never give up on anything you want. Don't ever let anyone tell you that you can't do something."









SPECIAL OLYMPICS

The Villanova Battalion regularly participates by distributing awards for various Special Olympics competitions. From bocce ball to running races, they are constantly there to congratulate the athletes and make the awards a special experience. Members within the Villanova Battalion regularly volunteer throughout the weekend to help facilitate events for the athletes. The event is the largest annual student-run Special Olympics event in the world.

DAY OF SERVICE

Villanova NROTC plays a significant role in the Day of Service. This year, nearly every midshipman participated, with the battalion contributing over 50 volunteers. With support from Army ROTC and Women's Rowing, the NROTC Battalion was tasked with cleaning the grounds of the Medal of Honor Grove in Valley Forge. By cleaning markers, weeding, clearing brush, and raking leaves, this dedicated group made a meaningful impact by assisting the Friends of the Medal of Honor Grove in maintaining the site, honoring heroes, preserving history, and inspiring future generations.

NURSE CORPS

The NROTC Nurse Corps Program, a specialized track within the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps (NROTC), is designed for individuals who aspire to pursue a career in nursing while serving as officers in the United States Navy. This prestigious program seamlessly blends rigorous academic coursework in nursing with structured military training, preparing midshipmen to excel both as healthcare professionals and as leaders in a military setting.

One of the key benefits of this program is the opportunity to receive an outstanding nursing education from esteemed institutions such as the M. Louise Fitzpatrick College of Nursing, which ranks among the top 4% of nursing programs nationwide. This combination of high caliber academics and hands-on military experience ensures that graduates emerge as highly skilled, adaptable, and well-rounded professionals, equipped to handle the dynamic challenges of military healthcare.





Upon successful completion of the program and commissioning as Naval Officers, graduates have the opportunity to serve in a variety of settings, including world-class military medical centers such as Naval Medical Center San Diego (Balboa Hospital) or aboard Navy hospital ships like the USNS MERCY and USNS COMFORT. These assignments provide invaluable experience in delivering critical care, often in fast-paced or humanitarian mission environments. Currently, the unit boasts five dedicated nursing midshipmen, including MIDN 1/C Baca, who is on track to commission as a Navy Nurse Corps Officer and will be stationed at Portsmouth Naval Medical Center following graduation. With a strong foundation in both nursing and leadership, NROTC Nurse Corps graduates are uniquely prepared to make a meaningful impact in military medicine, whether in peacetime or on the front lines of humanitarian and combat missions.



HISTORY AND TRADITION

For decades, Villanova NROTC has been renowned for its involvement in Drill and Color Guard, both on and off campus. Midshipmen gain valuable experience in discipline, precision, and teamwork through these activities. Throughout the year, they diligently practice and perform drill, demonstrating excellence in their execution.

In addition to their drill performances, Villanova NROTC's Color Guard plays a vital role in representing the unit and the university. During the fall semester, MIDN 3/C Spenceley, as Color Guard CO, trained incoming 4/C Midshipmen, while MIDN 3/C Olivas took on the role of Color Guard CO in the spring, continuing the tradition of leadership and mentorship.





SETTING THE STANDARD

This year the battalion instituted a Special Warfare Development Group, offered to all midshipmen who are pursuing a career in naval special warfare. Led by MIDN 1/C Wood throughout the first semester, the SPECWAR group focused on exercises, workouts, and techniques that could be seen in pipelines for EOD and SEAL officers. Things such as pool workouts on Sundays, pipeline focused workouts on Mondays, and administering the Physical Screening Test (PST) were all things that were focused on throughout the first semester. Transitioning into the second semester the SPECWAR group integrated with the Marine Options for Monday, Wednesday, and Friday workouts which often include a mix of running, lifting, swimming, and rucking. Recently, the SPECWAR group completed their 6-mile hike with the Mos around Mount Joy. By offering this experience the battalion hopes to help midshipmen have the best preparation and chance to get selected for the EOD or SEAL officer pipeline.





OFFICER CANDIDATE SCHOOL PREPARATION

Marine Options and Navy Options aspiring to join the Naval Special Warfare (NSW) community have been hiking multiple times per semester. In the fall, 3, 4, and 6 mile hikes were executed. In the spring, 4, 6, and 9-mile hikes are conducted. These hikes are performed at Valley Forge National Historic Park or the Wissahickon Trail in Ambler, PA. MIDN begin with 45 lbs and work up to 65 lbs. Marine Corps Officer Candidate School (OCS) graduates hike with 65 to 85 lbs.

In the fall semester, Marine Options traveled to Fort Dix to conduct a fall field exercise (FEX). This was an overnight exercise where MIDN slept in a bivouac site they created. During the FEX, MIDN practiced small unit leadership evaluation (SULE) lanes, land navigation, Marine Corps Martial Arts Program (MCMAP), casualty evacuation (CASEVAC) drills, and a hike. In the spring, MIDN go down to Quantico, VA for another FEX. In addition to all of the exercises done during the fall FEX, MIDN also are evaluated in a leadership reaction course (LRC) and the USMC obstacle course.

This year, the battalion has organized multiple bonding activities, including quizzos, a bowling outing, and participation in various intramural sports. For the first battalion quizzo, MIDN 1/C Shanley, Wood, and Alcalay emerged victorious. The quizzos provide a great bonding experience for the entire battalion, featuring catered food and an opportunity to enjoy a meal together while answering trivia questions. On February 22, 2025, some members of the battalion enjoyed a day of bowling while indulging in Campus Corner pizza. This past year, there was strong participation in intramural sports, including basketball, flag football, and dodgeball. In basketball, the Salty Dogs finished the regular season with a 2-2 record, which was enough to secure a playoff spot.






