West Virginia's Medicaid Managed Care Organizations: A Managed Care Organization (MCO) is a health insurance company that partners with a state to help deliver health care services to people enrolled in Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). West Virginia's MCOs help members get the care they need by: connecting members to doctors, clinics, specialists, and hospitals; offering 24-hour Nurse Line support; providing care management to help coordinate services for members with ongoing or complex needs; and other services.
