

Notice to Law Students of Disclosures Required by Federal Law – 2018

This notice is being provided to you as required by the Higher Education Act and its various amendments. Villanova University annually makes information and various statistics available to the University community, including information which is required to be disclosed by federal law. The following information is currently available either on the University's website at the links listed below, on the University's [Higher Education Act \(HEA\) Information web page](#) or in hard copy. For those reports available online, the University will provide you with a hard copy upon request to the particular department.

1. A student who has been convicted of any offense under any Federal or State law involving the possession or sale of a controlled substance for conduct that occurred during a period of enrollment for which the student was receiving any grant, loan, or work assistance under federal law, shall not be eligible to receive any federal grant, loan, or work assistance during the period beginning on the date of such conviction and ending after the interval specified on the following table:

If convicted of an offense involving:

The possession of a controlled substance:

First offense
Second offense
Third offense

Aid ineligibility period is:

1 year
2 years
Indefinite

The sale of a controlled substance:

First offense
Second offense

2 years
Indefinite

A student whose eligibility has been suspended under the above paragraph may resume eligibility before the end of the ineligibility period determined under such paragraph if – (a) the student satisfactorily completes a drug rehabilitation program that – (i) complies with such criteria as prescribed by regulations, and (ii) includes two unannounced drug tests; (b) the student successfully passes two unannounced drug tests conducted by a drug rehabilitation program that complies with such criteria as prescribed by regulations; or (c) the conviction is reversed, set aside, or otherwise removed from the student's record. 7. Students are reminded that the unauthorized distribution of copyrighted material, such as through peer-to-peer networks, is illegal and violates University policy. Information concerning unauthorized peer-to-peer file sharing is available in the [Copyright Infringement and Illegal File Sharing Policy](#). Copyright Infringement is the act of exercising, without permission or legal authority, one or more of the exclusive rights granted to the copyright owner under section 106 of the Copyright Act (Title 17 of the United States Code). These rights include the right to reproduce or distribute a copyrighted work. In the file-sharing context, downloading or uploading substantial parts of a copyrighted work without authority constitutes infringement. Penalties for copyright infringement include civil and criminal penalties. In general, anyone found liable for civil copyright infringement may be ordered to pay either actual damages or “statutory” damages affixed at not less than \$750 and not more than \$30,000 per work infringed. For “willful” infringement, a court may award up to \$150,000 per work infringed. A court can, in its discretion, also assess costs and attorneys’ fees. Sections 504, 505. Willful copyright infringement can also result in criminal penalties, including imprisonment of up to five years and fines of up to \$250,000 per offense. For more information, please see the [U.S. Copyright Office website](#), along with their [FAQ document](#).
