2023 Truman Scholarship Internal Application

The Center for Research and Fellowships and the Villanova Truman Scholarship Committee will evaluate the candidate based on a completed application and (if shortlisted) an interview.

Candidates for one of Villanova's four Truman Scholarship nominations should submit their completed internal application at <u>this link</u> by 11:59 PM on <u>Monday, November 6, 2023</u>. Shortlisted candidates will interview via Zoom on a later date in November. Submitting an internal application does not guarantee university endorsement.

A complete application consists of the following:

- 2. Your resume
- 3. Your transcript (a copy of your unofficial transcript is sufficient)

Please combine application items 1-3 into a <u>single PDF document</u> (titled "Last Name, First Name Truman Scholarship Application").

4. Describe the graduate education program you intend to pursue if you receive a Truman Scholarship. Please list specific institutions, courses of study, and faculty members that you intend to work with. (<500 words)

5. What do you hope to do and what position do you hope to have upon completing your graduate studies? (<300 words)

6. What do you hope to do and what position do you hope to have five to seven years later? (300 words)

7. What additional personal information do you wish to share with the committee? This should detail some aspect about your life, background, experience or interests that is not represented elsewhere in the application. (<500 words)

 What policy recommendation would you make to address the issue that you identified in question 3? Describe the problem, discuss how your policy proposal would address the issue, and discuss potential challenges to implementation of your proposal. You may include an additional Works Cited page. (<500 words)
