Weekend college: A program that allows students to take a complete course of study and attend classes only on weekends.

Within a dual enrollment program: Program within an organized system with special guidelines that allows high school students to take

*Women's center: Center with programs, academic activities, and/or services intended to promote an understanding of the evolving roles

Work experience (as admission factor): Special consideration given to students who have been employed prior to application, whether for

External scholarships and grants: Scholarships and grants received from outside (private) sources that students bring with them (e.g., Ki

Financial aid applicant: Any applicant who submits any one of the institutionally required financial aid applications/forms, such as the F

Indebtedness: Aggregate dollar amount borrowed through any loan program (federal, state, subsidized, unsubsidized, private, etc.; exclud

Institutional scholarships and grants: Endowed scholarships, annual gifts and tuition funded grants for which the institution determines

Financial need: As determined by your institution using the federal methodology and/or your institution's own standards.

Need-based aid: College-funded or college-administered award from institutional, state, federal, or other sources for which a student must

Need-based scholarship or grant aid: Scholarships and grants from institutional, state, federal, or other sources for which a student must

Need-based self-help aid: Loans and jobs from institutional, state, federal, or other sources for which a student must demonstrate financia

Non-need-based scholarship or grant aid: Scholarships and grants, gifts, or merit-based aid from institutional, state, federal, or other sou
