

ABOUTTHE SPEAKERS

SALADIN AMBAR is professor of political science and senior scholar at the Center on the American Governor at the Eagleton Institute of Politics at Rutgers University. He is the author of six books and is a scholarly adviser to the Lincoln Presidential Foundation and Woodrow Wilson Presidential Library and Museum.

RUTH BIENSTOCK ANOLIK teaches in the English and Theology Depts at Villanova University. Her writing on Gothic literature focuses on the interchange between horror writing and the actual horrors of the real world.

DEREK ARNOLD has been a member of the Villanova Communication Department for over 15 years. He studied and made films as part of his Communication degree from LaSalle University. He studies the connections between persuasion and politics, and media and rhetoric.

MICHAEL BRADLEY is an Assistant Instructor at Villanova who has been part of the school's faculty for more than 10 years. His writing work has appeared in dozens of national and regional publications and online outlets, and he is the author of 33 books. He has also appeared on several TV and radio networks, including ESPN.

VALENTINA DENARDIS is the Director of the Classical Studies program at Villanova. Her research interests include Greek and Latin poetry, classical reception, and neoclassical architecture and design. She also teaches classes on Classical Mythology.

TRAVIS FOSTER is an Associate Professor and Academic Director of the Gender and Women's Studies program at Villanova. His research focuses on American literature and culture up to roughly 1910.

DAN JEFFERSON is a graduate of Haverford College and a lifelong cineaste. His love of film was nurtured by David Grossman, who headed Temple University's Center City Campus movie house and Philadelphia Film Forum.

HEZEKIAH LEWIS, a native Californian, has an MFA in directing from UCLA's film school. Lewis has directed and produced films that have been recognized with both domestic and international awards. He is a Professor in the Communication Department at Villanova.

SUSAN MACKEY-KALLIS is a Professor in the Communication Department at Villanova University. Her teaching and research are in the areas of rhetorical criticism of film, media, and popular culture.

SUSAN MARCOSSON works in education and is a self-taught film enthusiast. Her cameo in M. Night Shyamalan's Unbreakable was cut from the film but appears in the DVD version.

COLLEEN MITCHELL is an Assistant Teaching Professor and Associate Director of Outreach of the Augustinian Institute at Villanova. She is a scholar of the history of political thought, particularly the ancient, medieval, and early modern periods.

JOHN O'LEARY is the director of The Cultural Film and Lecture Series at Villanova University. He has co- written two chapters for books about situation comedies. He is also the co-founder of The Social Justice Documentary Program.

JOHN-PAUL SPIRO is a Teaching Professor in the Augustine and Culture Seminar Program. He also teaches courses on Shakespeare, political philosophy, and stand-up comedy.

BRIAN SATTERFIELD is a Teaching Professor in the Augustine and Culture Seminar Program, as well as a Lawrence C. Gallen Fellow in the Humanities at Villanova.

RICK WORLAND is Professor in the Department of Electronic Media and Film at Southern Methodist University. He has published many articles dealing with American popular culture in books and scholarly journals.



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


All films are screened at the Connelly Center Cinema. Parking available in the St. Augustine (M2) lot behind the Connelly Center



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
