Who are we?

Villanova Army ROTC functions as Bravo Company in the Dauntless Battalion. Based out of Widener University, formerly Pennsylvania Military College, the Dauntless Battalion has a rich history dating back to before the Civil War. It is the goal of the Dauntless Battalion to train and produce top level cadets to serve as Army officers. Our company currently has 32 cadets that not only come from Villanova, but from our cross-town programs at Penn State Abington and Bryn Mawr College.

Our cadets are active on Villanova's campus in intramural, club, and Varsity sports, Special Olympics, NOVA Dance, Greek life, Nurses Without Borders, Orientation, Blue Key, Outdoors Club and so much more. Color Guard, Ranger Challenge, recruiting, community service, and volunteer firefighting are just a few of the opportunities that further involve our cadets not just in ROTC, but in the

surrounding community as well.

The AROTC curriculum features physical training three times a week, military science class once a week, and a weekly hands-on, tactical military science lab. SUMMER TRAINING OPPORTUNITY HIGHLIGHTS

Air Assault School



Cadets Brantley, Chandler, Sullivan, and Zisk attended, and passed, the Army's Air Assault School. They spent 10 mentally and physically tough days training in Air Assault, sling load, and rappelling operations. Deemed the "10 toughest days in the Army," the school requires students to pass an obstacle course, written tests, hand-ons practicals, and 6 and 12 mile rucks to earn the coveted Air Assault wings.

Cadet Leader Training (CTLT)

Cadets are able to spend 3-4 weeks shadowing officers of various units to gain insight into what being an officer looks like in different branches. CDT Nachurski traveled to Grafenwöhr, Germany where he primarily worked with a Signal officer, CDT Roche spent time with an Engineer officer in Ft. Cavazos, and CDT Zagdanski shadowed an officer at a Military Police Unit at Joint Base Lewis-McChord (JBLM).



Nurse Summer Training Program (NSTP)



CDT Wolter spent 28 days at Madigan Army Medical Center at JBLM, Washington. She had the opportunity to works alongside an Army Nurse and gain hands-on experience in the OR, pediatrics unit, medical-surgical unit, NICU, cardiac catheter lab, and so much more. This experience allows nurses to spend time in an Army hospital while further developing their nursing skills.

US Army Corps of Engineers

Through the internship I gained experience working on job sites, communicating with civilian contractors and inspectors, and understanding how government construction sites are funded and operated. 
